

General structure of the essay

Introduction

The introduction should contain some commentary on the topic of the essay - perhaps definitions of key concepts or an explanation of how you understand the question. Also in this section you should list which aspects of the topic you will be considering and why.

Remember that an essay is not a novel, so you only need to select a few basic arguments to explain the topic. The introduction should give you a clear idea of what you are going to talk about next, and the instructor should see that you are giving an answer to a specific set of questions, or that a cheap essay writer may write the answers for you and you will save time. Such services always come to the aid of essay writing.

So, a good introduction should:

- Show your intention of answering the question;
- show that you understand the subject;
- outline the structure of your answer and the main aspects you will consider (your plan);
- confirm that you have done some research, and refer to one of your sources;
- fully match the topic;
- be concise and take up about 8-9% of the total text (for example, 120 words in a 1500-word essay).

Note: Those who find it easier to navigate in the number of characters rather than words will find the following formula useful: one English word is on average taken as 6 characters (including spaces), i.e. a 500-word essay contains approximately 3000 characters with spaces.

Start your essay with a key phrase that indicates the direction of your answer. For example:

- This essay deals with...
- This assignment will examine...
- This report will analyse...

Use the same or similar wording as in the essay topic. If the question sounds like "Discuss recent developments in communication technology", use the same or similar wording as in the essay subject. In the introduction you can write: "This essay will consider recent developments in the field of communication..." . More certainty: leave the reader no room for doubt.

You can also use these words and expressions that will highlight your work plan, for example:

- The essay is divided into four sections...
- It will first consider...
- It will then continue to describe...
- The third part compares...
- Finally, some conclusions will be drawn as to...

Main part

The main part should disclose each of the arguments using examples and illustrations. The information should be clearly divided logically (for this purpose the text is divided into paragraphs). You need to think over the structure of the essay and make sure that the main part leads to the conclusion logically.

Conclusion .

The conclusion should sum up the ideas expressed. Here, an answer to the question formulated in the topic of the essay should be given. Or, depending on the topic, indicate the prospects or consequences of the problem under consideration.

Also, in this section, you can formulate related topics worthy of further reflection and express personal views - if they are supported by the arguments you have mentioned earlier.

A good conclusion is this:

- not just summing up. The conclusion should be a thoughtful conclusion to the work, for example, by applying what is written to the real situation.
- quintessence, i.e. a short list of basic ideas. It is worth to refer to the introduction and draw parallels using the same key words or images, but using a different wording. Do not repeat word for word.
- reinforce the ideas of the main part of the work. Different kinds of essays require different conclusions. In a short paper, you don't need to repeat the main ideas in detail, but in a longer paper you may need it.
- perhaps a thought-provoking question, a vivid spectacular image, a quote if appropriate.
- Optionally - a forecast of the results or consequences, a possible solution, a call to action.

At the same time, there are moments that should be avoided in the conclusion of the essay:

- to come up with completely new ideas. If they are really important, include them in the main part.
- use an exculpatory tone. Be sure of what you are saying. Avoid phrases like "I may not be an expert" or "At least this is my opinion."
- focus on too little detail.
- refute the importance of previous arguments.

In the opinion of many teachers, the conclusion is the most important part of the essay. It demonstrates that you have a good command of the material and a thoughtful approach to the problem. Do not worry if the conclusion will make you rewrite other parts of the text. In fact, it is a good sign!

As a general idea of the length of each section, you can use the following formula (this is a recommendation but not a strict rule):

Introduction - 7-8% of the length of the essay

Conclusion - 12-15% of the essay volume
